Reflections with Pastor Scott

"O LORD, our Sovereign, how majestic is your name in all the earth! You have set your glory above the heavens. ²Out of the mouths of babes and infants you have founded a bulwark because of your foes, to silence the enemy and the avenger. ³When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars that you have established; ⁴what are human



beings that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them? Yet you have made them a little lower than God, and crowned them with glory and honor. You have given them dominion over the works of your hands; you have put all things under their feet, all sheep and oxen, and also the beasts of the field, the birds of the air, and the fish of the sea, whatever passes along the paths of the seas. O LORD, our Sovereign, how majestic is your name in all the earth! Psalm 8

Thanksgiving is right around the corner and many of us will begin thinking about the things we are thankful for in life. Psalm 8 is one of those texts that always moves me to thankfulness. First and foremost, verses 3 & 4 stick out in my mind. When you look at the vastness of the universe and stop to think how utterly small we are in the midst of that expanse, what a gift it is that the God who created this universe is mindful of us and cares for us. Seriously, take an intentional few minutes to sit in the reality of how small and *insignificant* we are in this massive universe, much of which we still have not discovered or fully understood. God is *mindful* of and *cares* for YOU in the middle of all this. That means to God YOU/WE *are significant* despite our tiny stature in this vast universe.

Second, verses 6 & 8 remind me of all that God has placed in my/our care. That's what dominion is about, care. It isn't about domination and doing what we want because we are the big wigs in creation. No, it's about reflecting who God is, who created all this and TRUSTS us to care for it. Why would God create this amazing universe and then say, "Do what you want. If you want to destroy it, go ahead. If you want to treat it like trash, sure. Go ahead" NO! Dominion has behind it the idea of leaving something better than you find it. That reflects who God is, who Christ is. Christ's life, death and resurrection is a reminder of God's desire to transform us where we need transforming. Bringing life where we have chosen death and choices that lead to death for ourselves and our neighbors we are called to love.

Reflecting more on psalm 8, I guess there is a third piece in my thanksgiving. I am thankful for the *opportunities* that God has laid out before us in this life. Many opportunities for many different people that can cover all the different opportunities with our variety of gifts. We are these beautifully made individuals tied together as one in the God who made us and placed us in this opportunity filled world. Together we have much to be thankful for and together we have much to offer. So what are you thankful for this year?

From the Bishop:

November 2024

Dear Beloveds,

As the election season is here – and for many, your vote has already been cast – I have been doing some reflecting on what it means to vote as a Lutheran Christian. Please know that I am not telling you who to vote for in this election. It is not for me to tell you who to vote for. I mean, after all, God is neither Republican or Democrat, or even American.

But in saying that, I am not abdicating the responsibility that we have as Lutheran Christians who live in a country where voting matters. As children of God, we are called to vote beyond our own self-interest or individuality. As people who follow Jesus, we are called towards God's vision of a just and mercy-filled world. As people who have received grace upon grace, we are called to stand against injustice, and to remind everyone that, in God's eyes, every single person is loved and beloved.

So, here are a few thoughts and questions:

1. Jesus is all about loving one's neighbor. Even when it is hard. When he is asked, "Who is my neighbor," Jesus expands his answer beyond imagination. In Jesus' stories and actions he constantly goes to those who are on the outside, those marginalized, those without status, and shows how they are loved by God – how they are, in fact, his neighbor.

As you vote: Who is your neighbor?

2. Throughout scripture, hospitality to the stranger is embraced. In the Old Testament, the command to welcome strangers is repeated 37 times. In Matthew 25:35 Jesus says, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me."

As you vote: Who is the stranger?

3. God's will and God's calling is towards equity and justice for those who have been silenced, oppressed, or harmed. As we hear in Isaiah, "Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, and plead for the widow."

As you vote: Who are the silenced, the oppressed, the harmed?

4. The eighth commandment declares that we are called to not bear false witness against our neighbor. This, of course, means not lying about another. This means no name-calling or false accusations. But it goes beyond this. As Martin Luther tells us in his Small Catechism, we are to defend our neighbor, speak well of our neighbor, and explain everything in the kindest way.

As you vote: Who is speaking truth?

5. God created this beautiful earth and declared that we are both part of the creation and are also called to be stewards. As we read in the ELCA social statement, *Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice*, we affirm that it is God's intention for the healing and wholeness of creation.

As you vote: Who is caring for creation?

Dear Beloveds of God, there is so much more that could be written about the state of the country and what voting means. We could make this all complicated and intricate and difficult. (And to be fair, the United States sometimes feels shaky and unmoored). But truly it comes down to this: God's love is unconditional and unending. Jesus came to this earth to show, to embody, to be God's love for us and for all people. And so, knowing this, trusting this, believing this, we are called. We are called, as baptized and sent children of God, to show this love to the world. We are called to vote against hate. We are called to vote for God's love. As we hear in 1 John, *There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear ... We love because God first loved us*.

Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in Holy Baptism: ...To proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of our Lord Jesus, to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?" (LBW 201)

In a culture where we have as part of our constitution a prohibition on creating a state religion, which has come to be seen as a separation of church and state, I always struggled as a public-school teacher to understand how to live my faith publicly. My freedom of religion didn't end at the schoolhouse door, so I was free to wear my cross and to be open about my faith, but not allowed to preach it. It was a fine line. Even though I am now retired, I continue to struggle with how I publicly live out the promise to proclaim the good news through word and deed, serve people following Jesus' example, and strive for justice and peace which I made when I affirmed my baptism. It is especially hard when our politics are so polarized, and taking a public stand can seem risky both emotionally and physically. Therefore, I was very happy to see that LiVE was offering a class on Faith in Public Life this fall.

One of the first assignments in the course was to watch a short video in which Diana Butler Bass shared her insights into faith and politics. What I liked about this presentation was that she directly addressed our desire to not be divisive in our church communities. When you have people who are Republican and Democrat sitting side by side in the pews, it can be hard to navigate. But, as she pointed out, while the Gospel is always political, it is never partisan - except when it comes to love. The fear of being divisive doesn't just apply to our communities of faith, of course. I know many families in which conflicts arise, even among people who engage in similar faith practices. Family gatherings become tense, so we agree to avoid talking about religion and politics. Friends express their political positions on social media, and it is tempting to just not rock the boat, to meekly go along to get along, to say that faith is a private matter.

However, if I am truly going to live out my baptismal promises, I cannot be timid. According to the ELCA's governing documents, pastors are called to "speak publicly to the world in solidarity with the poor and oppressed, calling for justice and proclaiming God's love for the world." I am not a pastor, but I am a member of the priesthood of all believers. It is my call, as well, to speak against oppression. In the face of fascism and injustice, silence and apathy are not options. To live my faith publicly is to follow Jesus' example, to ask myself not only, "What would Jesus do?" but also "What would Jesus NOT do?" We know we are to welcome the stranger, feed the hungry, and love our neighbor, but we also know what Jesus rejected when he was tempted by the devil: kingdoms, wealth, and putting God to the test. If my faith truly is reflected in my public actions and political decisions, I must actively promote altruism, compassion, and justice and renounce greed, narcissism, and hubris - and vote accordingly - even when friends and family may not see eye-to-eye with me. As Professor Dumbledore says at the end of *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone* (British title and edition), 'There are all kinds of courage,' ... 'It takes a great deal of bravery to stand up to our enemies, but just as much to stand up to our friends.'

As we approach our presidential election and other ballot issues this month, I pray that we will all have the courage to live out our baptismal promises: to strive for justice and peace, to speak truth in the face of falsehoods, and to serve our neighbors with compassion and, of course, love. May the world know we are Christians by our words and our deeds and because we stand always on the side of love.

- **Synod Executive Committee**: The Synod Executive Committee met on October 10 via Zoom. Our primary business was to set the agenda for our November Council Meeting.
- Other Synod Committees:
- ♦ **Grants Task Force**: This is a new task force looking at best practices for awarding grants for new and renewing congregations. Our first meeting was October 9.
- ♦ Policy Review Committee: We met on October 17 to review our communications policies.
- Faith in Public Life: I have been participating in the LiVE Project's course on Faith and Public Life.

Lutheran Disaster Response Hurricane Response

The situation:

In late September, Hurricane Helene hit the coast of Florida as a Category 4 hurricane and moved inland as a deadly storm, leaving devastation throughout the southeastern United States. The storm caused shocking, dangerous flooding, especially in western North Carolina and Tennessee, washing away whole towns and roads, leaving millions of people without power, and driving thousands from their homes.

Hurricane Milton hit Florida as a powerful Category 3 hurricane, bringing storm surge, heavy rains, winds and tornadoes. Milton is one of the strongest hurricanes to hit the area in decades. At least four people have died, and millions are without electricity. This storm is particularly devastating because many communities are only beginning to recover from Hurricane Helene, which hit the Southeast just two weeks ago.

Our response:

Lutheran Disaster Response works with its partners to provide immediate relief, such as water, food, clothing, gift cards, tarps and other needs. Since many hurricanes also require a long-term response, Lutheran Disaster Response provides support on the long road to recovery with disaster case management, construction management, attention to unmet needs, and emotional and spiritual care.

What you can do:

Pray

Please pray for the safety of communities impacted by hurricanes, including people in their paths and any emergency services personnel who are responding. May God's healing presence give them peace and hope in their time of need. Pray that God will deliver comfort to those who mourn and strength to those working diligently to rescue survivors.

Give

Gifts to <u>Lutheran Disaster Response</u> equip us to respond to those affected by hurricanes and related disasters, such as mudslides, severe storms and flooding. These gifts also empower us to respond to disasters whenever and wherever they strike. Gifts to "<u>Hurricane Response</u>" will be used in full (100%) to assist those affected by hurricanes, until the response is complete.

This past month the Property Management Team has observed, supervised, or completed the following tasks:

Spraying for small ants in the Fellowship Hall, hallways, and bathrooms randomly continued most of the month.

Two burnt out fluorescent tubes were replaced in the hallway entrance by the bathrooms.

Several outside walkway night lights were out and replaced with LED lights.

Replaced a couple doorstops that were not working properly.

Replaced burnt out lights in the Men's and Women's bathrooms with LED bulbs.

Broken soap dispensers in Men's and Child Care Boy's bathrooms were replaced

Alpine Septic cleaned septic filter, had to delay pumping to respond to an emergent tasking

Repaired starters on both John Deere riding mowers

Replaced broken sink stopper connection in Men's bathroom

Experienced early morning beeping from new Fire Detection system. Noticed TROUBLE light on panels, called Dispatch. It was a company software hiccup that needed correction. Placed units on SILENT. System was normal several hours later.

Received a late night "informative" text from Dispatch that Child Care electrical power was out, and our alarm system was on battery backup. Not sure when, but power was restored, and the system was functioning properly when checked early morning.
